EASTER REFLECTION

Hallelujah, He is risen! Christ is risen indeed! All around the world Christians sing, shout, and share this Good News on Easter morning. The relationship between God and his creation was broken by our desire to be like Him. It was restored by God's decision to be like us; to suffer and die for us; and to rise again with a promise that all will be restored. Jesus said, "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going." Does this promise of Jesus guide us just through Easter or all the other 364 days of the year?

Easter promises that death no longer has a hold over us. Yes, those we love will die. And we will experience that as well. But death no longer has a grip on us; or it shouldn't, if we truly believe what we're saying on Easter morning. Can we affirm Paul's claim that death has lost its sting because of the empty tomb? There's a poem that begins like this, "Birth is a beginning and death is a destination. And life is a journey." And it ends like this, "victory lies not at some high place along the way, but in having made the journey, stage by stage, a sacred pilgrimage. Our time on earth is limited and we have to make the most of it. We need to continually search for meaning, purpose, truth, and value in our lives.

Easter reminds us that we have been reborn in Christ. It reminds us that the fear of living each day to its fullest is only as strong as we believe it to be. Jesus knew all along how his sacred pilgrimage would end. On many occasions he tried to tell his disciples that his ministry would end on the cross, but not his life. It was a concept they couldn't comprehend. And even when they saw Him resurrected it took the power of the Holy Spirit to get them to live unafraid of the consequences of proclaiming the Good News to all who would listen. The power unleashed by the faith in Jesus, changed frightened disciples so that they were able to turn challenges into opportunities. They no longer feared life or death but walked confidently toward the destinations that God had prepared for them. May we respond to Easter this same way this year and every year.

How does the Easter message challenge us to live? Does it affect us at all? We aren't called to convince others of the reality of the empty tomb, but we are expected to live in that reality. We are called to change the way we think and act in the light of God's gift of eternal life. If we leave that empty tomb without being changed something is wrong. May the weight of our regrets and mistakes be lifted as we commit to follow Jesus Christ.

Subject: Solidarity with the Suffering: Reflection #2

Dear friends.

We arrived safely in Amman, Jordan last Friday, crossed the border into the occupied West Bank and drove up to Jerusalem 2 hours later. In the days since, we have filled every day from 8am until 9 or 10 at night meetings with local Christians to hear their stories, pray with them and try to understand the extremely painful context in which they have been called to witness.

The continuing Israeli assault on the people of Gaza is so brutal that you can see Palestinian Christians struggle to make sense of it, even after 4 months of the violence. Churches, hospitals, schools and the homes of most of the Christians (whose numbers have shrunk to only 1% of the population of Gaza) have been completely destroyed by the Israeli rocket and drone attacks. A Christian psychologist from Gaza broke down in tears when she tried to describe the accumulated trauma and its impact on young minds and hearts: "We have learned to fear the voice of the planes"-- which constantly overfly Gaza and strike terror in all the displaced Gazans.

While Gaza has dominated the headlines since October 7, the surprise to us is how the Israeli Government has ratcheted up the speed of its ongoing campaign to force Palestinians to emigrate or move off of valuable land. Groups of extremist settlers have been encouraged by the fiery language of Jewish nationalism used by Prime Minister Netanyahu and several members of his cabinet to "redeem the land", cleansing it of its non-Jewish population. The impact on Palestinian lives of the stepped-up campaign and sharp increase of settler violence has been staggering for us to witness:

Last Friday, we sat with Fakri, a 62 year old Palestinian grandfather who has lived all his life in his great-grandfather's house in the Jerusalem district of Silwan. This area of coveted Palestinian land has seen an aggressive campaign of harassment of Palestinian residents by armed Israeli gangs and the demolition of Palestinian homes. Fakri's home-- with everything he owned except the clothes he was wearing-- was bulldozed to the ground two days earlier. As we sat with him and heard his story, he said, "Even more painful than the demolition of my home was the demolition of my dreams". According to our hosts at the Sabeel Centre, 22 Palestinian homes have been demolished in 2024 in Jerusalem alone.

- The American executive director of the United Nations Relief & Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) said this: "October 7 was a tragic day for Israel. But the actions in Gaza are so far beyond that initial massacre that we now have a sustained massacre with extreme violence targeting primarily civilians, women, and children."
- This morning, we watched in horror as a Caterpillar bulldozer (yes, made in the USA) demolished the dreams of two Palestinian families in a district of Bethlehem. We stood with the families, prayed, and sang-- and two vehicles of Israeli Government riot police arrived to "keep order", but there was no stopping the bulldozer. I'm posting video from that encounter to Facebook and Instagram.
- In lengthy meetings with Palestinian Christian leaders from Bethlehem and Gaza, they wanted to know why the U.S. churches were so oblivious to their suffering. Their request? "You can help us most by praying for us and telling our story to your people."

These encounters with Palestinians have been intense and moving as our tears combined. But what keeps me awake at night is my part in all of this. A portion of my federal tax payments go to subsidizing Israel's continuing war on the people of Palestine-- the U.S. sends \$3.8 billion to the Israeli Government each year in military aid. And now I see with my own eyes what it is doing to Palestinian families.

Pray with me that a movement of justice-seekers-- Jewish, Christian, Muslim and non-religious-- would rise up in our nation to work for justice in Israel/Palestine. What's Happening...

The Session opened with prayer on March 11, 2024, and then heard a presentation from Rev. Skip Noftzger, the Executive Presbyter for Redstone Presbytery and from Danielle Kendig, a student pastor under the care of Redstone. Danielle told us about herself, her family, and her calling to be a pastor. Then Rev. Noftzger told us about the procedures and requirements of hiring a student pastor. The Session members were able to ask questions of both Rev. Noftzger and Danielle. Then they left the meeting and the Session members continued to discuss the possibility of hiring Danielle Kendig on a temporary part-time basis.

The members wanted time to discuss and prayerfully consider our options so it was decided that the meeting would be continued on March 18.

Two other items of timely importance were discussed. First, there was a recent inadvertent disclosure of names and physical addresses of church members. Following discussion, it was decided to notify authorities and the church members and take steps to add protection. You should receive a letter from the church about this.

Second was a reminder about the upcoming Presbytery meeting and a discussion of a representative from our session.

At that point, the meeting was suspended until March 18. On March 18, the meeting resumed with prayer, a bible reading. and Book of Order note about how we care for one another. Discussion about hiring Danielle Kendig resumed, and it was decided that we would proceed with hiring her on a part-time basis beginning April 14.

The minutes from the February Session meeting were approved with one spelling correction. Then the Treasurer's report was received.

Committee reports followed:

The Discipleship Committee reported on plans for the Eggstravaganza, Easter Flowers and Cards for shut ins. Potato Patch was also discussed.

Family Life discussed Coffee Conversations, Wheels and Wings and Mini-Golf and Potato Patch.

Mission reported on the collection for the Food Pantry (\$225), and the upcoming One Great Hour of Sharing collection on Palm Sunday.

Communication Committee discussed computer and media security issues.

Property Management reported that they will seek a 2nd bid for tree trimming.

Worship reported on plans for Palm Sunday.

In New Business, Martha O'Brien will fill the open office manager position beginning in the middle of May.

Kevin McKenrick was appointed as representative to the March 19 Presbytery Meeting.

The next stated Session meeting is April 8, 2024.

- Hosted by the New Hope Presbyterian Church, the Presbytery gathered both in person and by Zoom. For those who were able to be present in person, we celebrated with dinner and recognition of Bobbie Shaffor. She is retiring after twenty-two years of service as the Administrative Assistant. Many have been served by willing and helpful spirit.
- Continuing our focus upon being the community of Jesus Christ in our region, the Word was proclaimed by Rev. Liddy Barlow, Executive Minister of the Christian Associates of Southwestern Pennsylvania. Redstone Presbytery has been a longtime member of this important Christian organization of Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox leaders sharing in ministry together.
- With the leadership of the Committee on Ministry, the existing Family and Medical Paid Leave policy was revised for pastors serving in congregations throughout the Presbytery.
- Since 2024, Redstone Presbytery has partnered with our siblings in Christ in Sudan and later, South Sudan. Remembering those first steps of beginning this partnership, we celebrated twenty years of sharing in God's mission around the world.
- Acknowledging the progress of our two ministerial candidates as they
 endeavor in their educational and ministry experiences, we look forward
 to their completion in order to join in pastoral service. Additionally, ruling
 elders who may be sensing a call to learn more, grow and even preach,
 were encouraged to consider enrollment in IPLF which will begin a new
 cohort in August, 2024.
- The Communications Team reported on their desire for others to join them
 who have interest in serving God's kingdom in print, design, social media,
 and video media. As part of their initiative, a survey is being conducted on
 valued uses of various Presbytery communication resources in order to
 better serve both our shared ministry and individual congregations.
