Like the story of Abraham attempting the impossible, it seems insane for the revolutionaries deciding to take on England and the King for their independence and freedom.

The revolutionaries were less in number, lacked training, resources and their chain of governance was officially unorganized. Yet, they prevailed. Their mystery was their commitment, trust, and strength in their faith, that they were indeed fighting for their right and the cause of justice.

It is the nature of faith and Christian journey that we step forward trusting God's guidance and provision. Like Abraham, we're called to trust, obey and go the distance, though it seems impossible. Abraham embarked on a three-day journey yet didn't see God intervening until the last moment when he reached for the knife and was about to sacrifice the only thing he had,—Isaac his Son. At that moment the Angel of God shouted to him from heaven, "Abraham! Abraham!" "Lay down the knife; don't hurt the lad in any way..." God was convinced, Abraham became a trusted partner and a friend of God; "for I know that God is first in your life—you have not withheld even your beloved son from me," said the Lord.

What God had asked of Abraham was the hardest thing we could imagine sacrificing his only son. He was asked to go the distance. You can imagine the many thoughts running through his mind for all those three days and three nights. Yet, he did. This is what it means to trust in God who is present before us and asks of us unconceivable loyalty.

Like Abraham and the revolutionaries, you might be going through some challenging times with perplexing thoughts while you're making a lasting decision. But are you willing to go the distance? Do you believe that God would provide for our needs? Remember, God asks and does this for his own Name's sake. He cannot give up on you, as he promised Israel, saying, "how can I give you up, my Ephraim? How can I let you go? How can I forsake you like Admah (*dust*) and Zeboiim? (*Valley of hyenas*). My heart cries out within me; how I long to help you!" Hosea 11:8

God is always near to helps us with our weaknesses. He is our strength and provider. As the scriptures testify to us, the Lord won't give you a test that is beyond the level of your faith: no temptation has overtaken you except what is common to everyone. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, the Lord himself will provide a way out, like he did for Abraham, so that you can endure it. 1 Corinthians 13:10

Remember, no temptation is irresistible. You can trust God to keep the temptation from becoming so strong that you can't stand up against it, for he has promised this and will do what he says. Like Abraham and the revolutionaries, let us trust in the strength of God, believe him in all our decisions, and take a leap to go the distance for our faith. The Lord needs you to heed the call to follow, serve and abide in him.

According to a May 31st CBS news report on food insecurity in the U.S, "Antihunger advocates say the U.S. is facing an "unprecedented" rise in food insecurity amid persistently high inflation in the grocery aisle and cuts to the food-stamp program earlier this year." And cuts to the food-stamp program earlier this year <u>reduced</u> <u>benefits</u> at a time when groceries are 20% costlier than two years ago. That caused food insecurity to jump to "unprecedented levels" in May among food-stamp recipients, according to a <u>new survey</u> from Propel, which makes an app for beneficiaries to check balances for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, (formerly known as food stamps)."

### God requires patience, whether its in tending tomatoes or our lives

There is an unofficial, but very competitive race where I live in western Pennsylvania. For home gardeners, it is the race for the first home-grown ripe tomato. The goal is to have your first ripe tomato by July 4th and, of course, bragging rights with all the other neighbors. The first person to harvest that beauty is sure to post a picture on social media and expound on the loveliness of that first ripe tomato.

Many of us will do what we can to have the early tomato. We might gauge the weather and decide to risk it and plant early. We have different tricks to warm up the plant in the late spring and early summer to encourage it to grow more quickly. Varieties like "Early Girl" and "July Fourth" are planted, all promising to be early in production.

I do have to say that most years, in fact, almost every year, the ripe tomato by the Fourth of July is not to be. Most years, the tomatoes don't begin to ripen until late July. Yet, when the time comes, it is typically a bumper crop of ripe tomatoes.

I wonder if this is a chance for us to learn and grow as the church. I wonder if the first ripe tomato is a lesson for us individually as well. I wonder if in our fast-paced culture, with orders to our door the next day, grocery shopping from our



homes, and messages that come in both day and night that pushes us to respond immediately; I wonder if there is there a place for community, congregation, and church in the midst of an "I want it now" society? A place and people that do not push but hold fast to the promise that abundance will come in due season.

No matter the speed, desire, or want, in due season, when the time is right, God comes. I wonder if the church can model a different way that allows for breath and rest, a time for silence and prayer, and a time for worship and music. That we model a non-anxious presence that is counter to a world where we have to respond right now, everything is a crisis mentality. I wonder if we can pass on to our communities and those who connect with us in worship and the myriad of other ways that expectant waiting, loving presence and thoughtfulness of action and reply are important.

The disciples were told to wait in Jerusalem after Christ's ascension. In time, the promised advocate would come. So they waited and worshiped and ministered — until the Holy Spirit arrived, in God's time.

We are called into the ministry of Jesus Christ, but we cannot make God speed up or slow down the time and timing. We might be impatient, we might ask when, like the Psalmist, "How long O Lord, how long?" or like those in exile in Babylon who wanted to return immediately, but were told by the prophet Jeremiah, "Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare" (Jeremiah 29:4-7 NRSV).

In God's time, God's action and presence will be made known.

In time, the tomato harvest comes. Soon home gardeners in western Pennsylvania and other areas will be enjoying the delights of a tomato fresh from the garden. In time, the harvest comes for the church as well. In God's time. Until then, we tend, we water, we breathe, we worship, we sing, we pray, we expectantly wait, knowing that we are the beloved of God. May the blessings of God who comes in God's time be with you.

May you enjoy the first ripe tomato — I will be having mine on some toasted white bread with mayonnaise and a little salt and pepper.

# What's Happening ...

The Session opened their June 12<sup>th</sup> meeting with a reading of Galatians 6: 9-10: So, let's not allow ourselves to get fatigued with doing good ... let us work for the benefit of all. Prayer followed.

Family life provided refreshments for the May Presbytery meeting and prepared breakfast for Pentecost.

Mission gave a report on the Cambria-Gambella Collaboration meeting. Possible projects and a trip to Ethiopia were discussed.

The Pastor/Parish committee reported that Colver will host our joint service and picnic in August.

Property Management had good news. The water pipe into the church is copper, not lead and does not need to be replaced. Also, recent electrical problems were traced to a tripped breaker.

Worship- The committee proposed developing an online survey to help to determine why church members and friends have stopped attending and supporting our church.

It was MSP to receive the committee reports.

In Old Business, regarding the Major Repair Project for the windows, it was decided to not accept the agreement with ServPro and repair only the windows that face south. Only \$3650 has been collected,

which is far short of the \$76,000 estimate to repair all the windows.

A new contractor is being obtained to do the repair work.

In New Business, several items were considered.

Joint Worship Service and Picnic at Pine Springs Camp is scheduled for July 16<sup>th</sup>. We will not hold a service at Ebensburg on that Sunday.

- It was MSP to change the date of communion from August 6th to August 13th. Rev. Skip Noftzger will officiate.
- It was MSP to again have our Potato Patch and mini-golf during the Potato Fest on September 30th.

In the Moderator's Report, Pastor Ojulu gave thanks for leadership, time, and resource given by the elders. Contacts with members and shut-ins were noted. The pastor continues to serve the community and the larger church with various activities. His vacation is planned from Jul. 31-Aug. 31.

The Session will not have regular scheduled meetings during July and August. The next meeting in scheduled for September 11, 2023.




