## The Fellowship

Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful; and let us consider how to stimulate one another. to love and good deeds. (Heb 10:23–24).

It's September! Each of us knows what comes next. We celebrate Labor Day as usual, but most importantly we will soon feel the change of the weather: shorter days, longer nights, and less warmth before daylight saving time officially ends on November fifth, 2023. We will then get ready for some clothing appropriate for the cooler weather, and soon our summer attire will be only a memory. Those outfits will be shoved in closets until the next cycle of the seasons. Each of us has a different preference of season. While some of us favor summer, countless people cherish winter and thrive through it and a handful loves spring and fall. Yet the combination of four seasons makes up the year. A year includes all four seasons. No matter how much the seasons change, alternate or, occasionally do not yield to the expectations, (too much heat, cold, less flowers, less rain, less colors in the fall etc.), a year remains as the "Year!"

Ethiopians have a good proverb for this: "ላለፈው ክረምት ቤት አይሠራም" meaning, no one builds a hut for the last winter. That is the message of the Book of Hebrews! (We will be journeying through the book of Hebrew in this new month of September and will hear more about this great and resourceful book of faith!)

The Book of Hebrews calls on the messianic Jews and all of us to not turn from Christ to the old way of life, but fix our eyes on Jesus Christ, the pioneer and perfector of our faith (Hebrews 12:2), who is the culmination, better, and greater than all the angels, patriarchs, matriarchs, priests, and prophets before him. The author encourages us to cling to Jesus with perseverance (Hebrews 12:7). He demonstrates the theme of the supremacy of Jesus throughout the book.

Jesus is superior to the Angels, Moses, Aron, and the OT priestly ministry. He is superior to the angels because he is the divine king (Heb 1:4-8). While Moses was the servant of God, Jesus Christ is the son of God (Heb 3:3-4). Jesus is greater than Jeshua, all the Judges, and liberators of the OT because he has given greater rest to the people of God, including the people of Israel. To the high priests through the line of Aron and King David, Jesus is sinless and came through the order of Melchizedek, the king of Salem and Righteousness (Heb 7:26-28).

Therefore, as the year caps all the seasons, Paul said, Christ Jesus is the culmination of the law and the promises, "that there may be righteousness for everyone who believes" (Romans 10:4-11). As it encouraged its first audience of messianic Christians to not return to temple sacrifices and practices but press on and persevere, the book of Hebrews calls us to hold on and rely on Christ Jesus and to not turn away from the faith as we persevere through our 21<sup>st</sup> century hurdles against the church and our faith (Heb 4:14, 10:23). And the way we do this, is by "stimulating one another," meaning actively demonstrating faith, love, service, obedience, harmony, justice, and thanksgiving with/to one another (Heb 10:24). And since Jesus is one of us, though we fail, we must not hesitate to "... approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need" (Hebrews 4:14-16).

Come let's go!

## Major Repair Report

Fellow Congregation Members,

We would like to update you in regards to the window project that was announced earlier this year. The original plan was to replace the 50-year-old storm windows but at a great cost. The enormity of the expense weighed heavily on our minds, and after prayerful consideration we looked for a more thrifty plan. Elias Painting agreed to honor the terms of their proposal from a year ago to scrape, seal and repaint the window trim and to also replace/repair any wood sills that had rotted. It is this effort that you may have witnessed if you encountered their workers outside these past few weeks. Session is pleased to announce to you that while only spending 25% of the amount needed to replace the storm windows, we believe the work performed by Elias Painting will protect our windows for the foreseeable future.

Taking into consideration that approximately one third of our liquid assets would have gone to protecting the windows, the dire state of our financial endowments, and ever decreasing revenue combined with increasing costs, the Session decided to cancel the project with Servpro. We do want to thank the local manager of Servpro, Jeff Kuncelman for the many hours that he and his leading men spent assessing the work, educating the session on the scope of work, and presenting their proposal. Their proposal made concessions to save us money and would have minimized their profit for performing the work. The professional reputation of ServPro, their manager, and their workers should not be questioned because we decided to cancel their contract in consideration of our financial position.

To those of you who have made gifts to the project, thank you, and please know that this money will be used for its intended purpose of protecting the windows. We will publish a financial accounting of monies spent on the project and continued need in the near future. The situation we find ourselves in, regarding our finances, is ever more depleted each year, but the heart and generosity of its members beats on. As stewards of the body of the church, we weighed the overall survival of Ebensburg Presbyterian Church against the longevity of the windows and feel the amount of money saved could be used towards insuring more years of worship together. We all know the hardship that organized religion endures in these times as well as the challenges that weigh on each generation in our congregation and we place importance on maintaining resources enough to feed the soul of the church, which are its colorful members who give so much. Together we will find a way to go forth. Enlightening new members about the culture of music and worship together at EPC is the ultimate goal, and it is up to each of us to reach out to the few as we are able; to share the burden of our calling to enrich the lives of the many. May the Lord bless us and keep us, until we shall meet together again to praise His name.

## Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and the Presbytery of the Pacific respond to deadly fires on Maui

LOUISVILLE — Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is working with the Presbytery of the Pacific following this week's fires that killed at least 111 people in Lahaina on the Hawaiian island of Maui and also burned portions of south Maui and the island's Upcountry region. Earlier this week fires also burned brush on the Big Island of Hawaii, but those fires have been largely controlled. After seeing the devastation in Lahaina, Hawaii Gov. Josh Green called it "the worst national disaster that Hawaii has ever faced."

CBS News reported on Sunday that hundreds of people remain unaccounted for. The Federal Emergency Management Agency's administrator, Deanne Criswell, said that 150 FEMA personnel were on the ground in Maui, with more search and rescue teams on their way.

"It's clear there will be significant long-term recovery needs," said the Rev. Jim Kirk, PDA's Associate for National Response. For the people who want to respond and don't have the opportunity to provide donations or commodities right away, "there will be opportunities in the months and years ahead. That is hard for people to hear, because everyone wants to do something right now. The best thing to do right now is to wait and respond down the line."

The Presbytery of the Pacific has submitted an application for an initial assistance grant. In addition to portions of Los Angeles, the state of Hawaii is part of the presbytery.

In a Facebook post, the Presbytery of the Pacific asked for prayers for Presbyterian pastor and minister member the Rev. Dr. Kimberly Fong and for her congregation, Po'okela Church in Makawao, in the north-central portion of the island.



## "Being Justified freely by His Grace" Romans 3:24

IT was a solemn question which was proposed in the days of old, "How can man be just with God?" Man is without righteousness, he is chargeable with many crimes, he is brought in guilty, and condemned by God's holy law; and he has no excuse to make. His mouth is stopped. We feel this to be our situation by nature. But the Lord who is our Judge, hath devised a way by which He can be just, and yet justify us. It is by grace. He justifies, or acquits us from all charges, pronounces us righteous, accepts us, and introduces us into His Favor, friendship, and fellowship, freely, without anything being done or suffered by us. He presents us with the work of Jesus, by which all our debts are paid; our righteousness is wrought out; the law and government of God are honored; and a good title to eternal life is made out; we receive this work by faith, which He also bestows, and we are "justified from all things." Not one charge remains. There is no condemnation. But we are justified freely by grace without the works of the law.
